Along the way, you’ll connect with Cuban ornithologists, guides, and community members; stay in welcoming *casas particulares* (Bed & Breakfast establishments), and dine in cozy *paladars* (private restaurants), giving you an authentic taste of Cuba’s rich culture, delicious food, and warm hospitality. Discover Cuba through its birds, landscapes, and people—join us for an unforgettable experience in 2026!

BirdsCaribbean is offering three exceptional tours in 2026: a 10-day Birding, Culture, and Jazz Festival Tour (*new!*) in January, a 9-day Birding and Cultural Trip in February, and an 11-day Birding and Cultural trip in March. Led by outstanding certified Cuban guides Ernesto Reyes & Tania Piñeiro, and group leaders Lisa Sorenson (Executive Director, BirdsCaribbean), Holly Garrod (BirdsCaribbean’s Bird Banding Network Coordinator and Trainer) and Jeff Gerbracht (Checklist Working Group Co-Chair, BirdsCaribbean), these tours combine expert guidance with local insight. 
ITINERARY (11 DAY TRIP) – March 19 to 29, 2026¹

Day 1 (Havana, Las Terrazas & Viñales): Meet up with our Cuban guides, Ernesto and Tania at the airport and departure to **Viñales Valley**, the land of tobacco farms and beautiful

¹ **Note:** Itinerary is subject to change, depending on the weather and local conditions. We will aim to visit all the sites mentioned, but the timing of when we visit each location may differ from what is outlined here.

landscapes with limestone formations called *mogotes*. Lunch at **Las Terrazas UNESCO Biosphere Reserve** and eco-village, offers close-up views of our first Cuban and regional endemics (*Cuban Trogon*, *Cuban Grassquit*, *Cuban Green Woodpecker*, *Cuban Emerald*, *La Sagra's Flycatcher*, *Loggerhead Kingbird*) and a lovely setting for our family-style lunch on a patio. Along the way, we will also look for the *Stygian Owl*, *Snail Kites*, and waterbirds in dams built near to the highway. Dinner and check-in at B&B (2 nights).

Day 2 (Viñales): Morning birding nearby in **Viñales National Park/Parque de Viñales** in pursuit of *Cuban Solitaire*, *Cuban Tody*, *Cuban Trogon*, *Red-legged Honeycreeper*, *Western Spindalis*, *Great Lizard Cuckoo*, *Cuban Blackbird*, *Yellow-headed Warbler*, as well as some migrant species like warblers, tanagers, and buntings. During the afternoon, visit to **Benito's Tobacco Farm**, birding in pine forest near **El Albino Reservoir** to search for the *Olive-capped Warbler* and *Yellow-headed Warbler*, **San Vicente Farm** to look for the *Scaly-naped Pigeon*, and possible visit at the home of **Nils Navarro**, renowned Cuban wildlife artist and naturalist and author of *Endemic Birds of Cuba: A Comprehensive Field Guide*.

Day 3 (Orquideario de Soroa, Niña Bonita Reservoir, and Playa Larga/Zapata): Early breakfast and departure to **Zapata Swamp** (5+ hours), with stops en route to pick up more endemics and migrants and enjoy the magnificent scenery. Target birds at road-side wetlands include *King Rail*, *Northern Jacana*, *Yellow-breasted Crake*. We will also have a tour at the spectacular orchid gardens **Orquideario de Soroa** where we will look for the *Cuban Oriole* and the *Giant Kingbird* with many other birds possible.

Lunch en route and afternoon stop at **Niña Bonita Reservoir** to pick up migratory ducks and other waterbirds. By late afternoon we reach **Playa Larga**, a lovely little beach town on the **Bay of Pigs** on the Zapata Peninsula. **Zapata Swamp** is the third largest wetland in the Americas and the region offers the best birding in Cuba. About **254** species have been recorded for Zapata. It is a Biosphere Reserve and a Ramsar Site, where it is possible to see more than 20 Cuban endemics. Check-in at B&B (4 nights) and dinner.

Day 4 (Zapata: Las Salinas, San Blas wetland, and Casa Ana Birding): Early breakfast and depart by 7 am for Las Salinas Refuge (Las Salinas de Brito, nearby flat, dry-dirt roadway 1+ miles). Habitat varies among low, dense forest, mangrove, marsh, and open wetlands. Here we are likely to encounter the endemic *Cuban Black Hawk* as well as numerous shorebirds, seabirds, and waterbird species, including many *American Flamingo*, *Roseate Spoonbill*, *White Ibis*, *Reddish Egret*, *Wood Stork*, *Clapper Rail*, *Black-bellied Plover*, *Short-billed Dowitcher*, *Red Knot*, *Caspian Tern*, and others.

In the afternoon we will visit **San Blas wetland** to look for the *Red-shouldered Blackbird*, *West Indian Whistling-Duck*, *American Kestrel* (Cuban subspecies), and others. Depending

on the time available, we may visit the **Bay of Pigs Museum**, and **Casa Ana Birding gardens** for fabulous close-up views of the *Bee Hummingbird* (smallest bird in the world!), *Cuban Emerald*, *Cuban Pygmy Owl*, and dozens of warblers.

Day 5 (Zapata: Santo Tomas and Los Hondones): Early breakfast and departure for **Santo Tomas** (45 minutes) where we will have a lovely and peaceful ride into the swamp via pole-powered boats. Santo Tomas, with its sawgrass tussocks, is the type locality for Zapata Swamp and a classical place to see the *Zapata Sparrow* and *Zapata Wren*, among Cuba's most limited range endemic birds. It's a great location also to see *Gray-fronted Quail-Dove*, *Cuban Pygmy-Owl*, *Cuban Amazon*, *Cuban Parakeet*, *White-crowned Pigeon*, *Cuban Pewee*, *Great Lizard Cuckoo*, *Smooth-billed Ani*, *Cuban Tody*, and *Cuban Bullfinch*, as well as migratory warblers.

In the afternoon we will visit **Cueva de los Peces**, Cuba's largest underwater saltwater cave; optional swimming and snorkeling at the lovely reef just off the beach. Also, a great place to bird for those who prefer not to swim. And we will visit **Los Hondones**, a lovely eco-village where the community is developing organic farming and planting fruit and native trees—great attractions for many endemic birds, such as the *Bee Hummingbird*, *Blue-headed Quail-Dove*, *Cuban Amazon*, *Cuban Trogon*, *Cuban Tody*, *Cuban Pewee*, *Great Lizard Cuckoo*, *Cuban Emerald*, *Tawny-shouldered Blackbird*, *Cuban Blackbird*, *Yellow-faced Grassquit*, and many migrant warblers. Evening birdwatching for *Bare-legged Owl* and the *Cuban Nightjar*.

Day 6 (Zapata: Bermejás, Soplillar, possibly Enigma de las Rocas Trail): Early breakfast and departure to several sites in/ near Bermejás to search for the *Cuba Parakeet*, *Fernandina's Flicker*, *Key West Quail-Dove*, *Gray-fronted Quail-Dove*, *Blue-headed Quail-Dove*, and *Cuban Vireo*, among other endemic and migratory birds. We will have a delicious lunch at Ningo's organic farm. In the afternoon, we will look for the *Cuban Amazon* as well as other species for which we have not yet had good views or sightings. If we have not yet had a chance to swim or visit the Bay of Pigs Museum, etc., we will use this afternoon for these activities and/or visit Los Hondones or Casa Ana again to enjoy the birds at these sites.

Day 7 & 8 (Zapata, Cienfuegos, Trinidad): Morning departure heading east towards our destination, Trinidad, with birding stops en route to look for the *Cuban Gnatcatcher* and *Cuban Palm-Crow*. Cultural stop for coffee in **Cienfuegos**, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This bay-side city founded by French émigré and known as the "Pearl of the South," has a Parisian feel to it with its parks, tree-lined boulevards and colonnades—great place to spot the *Cuban Martin*. After this we will visit the **Cienfuegos Botanical Garden/ Jardín**

Botánico de Cienfuegos for a walking tour, birding, and lunch. Good chance here of seeing a nesting *Gundlach's Hawk* and many other species.

Trinidad, also a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is a one-of-a-kind, perfectly preserved Spanish colonial settlement. We will have some time to explore the cobblestone streets and enjoy the pastel-colored colonial mansions, plazas, and churches (built from huge sugar fortunes) and laid-back atmosphere. We spend two nights in Trinidad, with time for birding on the Ancon Peninsula and near Trinidad looking for the *Oriente Warbler*, *Giant Kingbird*, *Cuban Palm Crow*, and more.

Day 9 (Trinidad to Havana): Today we make our way back to Havana with brief birding stops and lunch en route. In the afternoon we will visit **Finca Vigía** (Lookout Farm) to tour Ernest Hemingway's estate, located in the town of San Francisco de Paula, 10 miles east of Havana. Hemingway purchased the property in 1940 and lived there for 20 years. This is where he wrote his celebrated novels: *The Old Man and the Sea* and *For Whom the Bell Tolls*. The beautiful house and property, restored by the Cuban government, is now a museum, with Hemingway's furniture, books, paintings, animal trophies, and other collectibles from his travels around the world on display. The house is listed as one of the 11 Most Endangered Places by the National Trust for Historic Preservation and on the World Monuments Fund's list of 100 Most Endangered sites. Visiting Finca Vigía is a must for Hemingway fans and great for non-fans as well as it also offers excellent birding on the property! Check into your B&Bs in Havana (2 nights), followed by dinner and music/dancing (optional).

Days 10 (Havana): A full day in Havana with diverse cultural activities including a walking tour of Old Havana and old-fashioned car ride. Other possible activities include visiting an art gallery or museum, street markets, or the National Botanical Gardens in Havana, a lovely place to bird and enjoy native tropical plants. Final dinner at a nice restaurant and live Cuban music and dancing into the evening (optional).

Day 11: Breakfast, check-out and transfer to the Havana Intl Airport for the one-hour flight to Miami.

Number of Travelers: Max. 10 plus guides

Possible Cuban endemic birds to see on this trip include: Cuban Black-Hawk, Gundlach's Hawk, Blue-headed Quail-Dove, Gray-fronted Quail-Dove, Bare-legged Owl, Cuban Pygmy-Owl, Bee Hummingbird, Cuban Trogon, Cuban Tody, Cuban Green Woodpecker, Fernandina's Flicker, Cuban Parakeet, Cuban Palm-Crow, Cuban Vireo, Zapata Wren, Cuban Gnatcatcher, Cuban Solitaire, Yellow-headed Warbler, Oriente Warbler, Cuban Grassquit, Zapata Sparrow

(also Cayo Coco subspecies, *T. inexpectata varonai*), Red-shouldered Blackbird, Cuban Blackbird, Cuban Oriole, Cuban Bullfinch, Cuban Nightjar, Cuban Palm-Crow.

Other species of interest (including regional endemics and Caribbean specialties) include: West Indian Whistling-Duck, White-cheeked Pintail, Great Lizard-Cuckoo, Cuban Amazon, West-Indian Woodpecker, La Sagra's Flycatcher, Cuban Pewee, Giant Kingbird, Loggerhead Kingbird, Cuban Crow, Red-legged Thrush, Olive-capped Warbler, Western Spindalis, Key West Quail-Dove, Ruddy Quail-Dove, Zenaida Dove, Plain Pigeon, Stygian Owl, American Kestrel (Cuban race), Antillean Palm Swift, Thick-billed Vireo, Cuban Emerald, Greater Antillean Grackle, Tawny-shouldered Blackbird, Eastern Meadowlark (Cuban race), American Flamingo, Wood Stork, Roseate Spoonbill, a great variety of waterbirds, and numerous other migratory and resident species.

The cost of the 11-day trip is \$4,895 (based on a max of 10 participants). This covers the following:

- Cuban Visa (\$100)
- Health insurance while in Cuba
- In-country transportation and driver through duration of trip
- Professional bilingual specialized bird guide (Ernesto Reyes)
- Group leader (Jeff Gerbracht)
- All lodging
- All meals and non-alcoholic beverages while in Cuba, tips at restaurants
- Admission fees (itinerary locations only)

Not included:

- Airfare to Miami and overnight in this city (March 18th) to be in position to depart for Havana on the morning of March 19th
- Airfare from Miami to Havana and return
- Tips for housekeeping, bird guide and driver, alcoholic beverages \$1–\$3
- Luggage fees and airport departure tax
- Single supplement (may not always be available) – add US\$500

We are traveling to Cuba under a group “Support for the Cuban people” license from the OFAC Department of Treasury. We will have a fulltime schedule of activities that enhances contact with Cuban people, provides support for private businesses and independent activities of Cuban people, and strengthens civil society in Cuba.



Once you have registered to go on the trip you will receive more information, including what to bring, what to wear, bird checklist, and travel in Cuba, which is an inimitable experience and part of the fun!

Rules, Terms and Legal Conditions:

- Participants agree to indemnify BirdsCaribbean and its representatives, from any and all third-party liability for any injuries, loss, claim, action, demand or damage of any kind arising from or in connection with participating in one of our field trips. Participants are required to sign a Liability Release Form (see below).
- BirdsCaribbean reserves the right to adjust the price of the tour if there is an unexpected increase in costs, or if the tour is not filled to a minimum capacity.
- BirdsCaribbean reserves the right to adjust the tour itinerary if unexpected circumstances warrant a change. Every effort will be made to provide a similar high-quality experience.
- In case of cancellation by BirdsCaribbean, all deposits and payments will be refunded (less a \$50 processing fee).
- Your deposit is nonrefundable. If you cancel your reservation **more than 30 days** prior to the tour (by Feb. 27, 2026), you will receive a 50% refund of fees paid over the deposit. If you cancel **less than 30 days** prior to the tour, all deposits and payments are non-refundable, unless you can fill your space with another participant.
